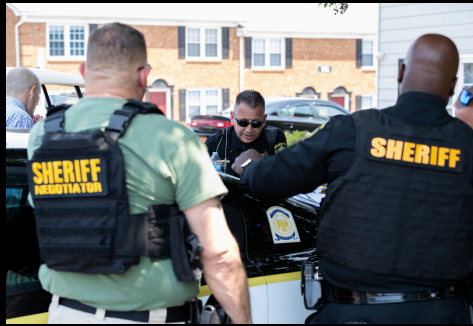


"It is my distinct honor and privilege to present the Forsyth County Sheriff's Office 2025 Annual Report.

# Sheriff Bobby F. Kimbrough, Jr.



Sheriff Bobby F. Kimbrough, Jr., was elected to office in 2018. His passionate commitment to serving others, coupled with his diverse career experiences in law enforcement, gives him a unique vision for the Office of Sheriff.

Born and raised in Forsyth County, Bobby graduated from North Forsyth High School before earning his Bachelor of Arts in Sociology from High Point University in 1991. Bobby then earned his master's degree in leadership from Piedmont International University in 2020. In May 2023, Bobby received his Honorary Doctor of Laws degree from Carolina University. Bobby is currently working to finish his Ph.D. in Public Administration and Organizational Leadership.

Bobby began his law enforcement career in 1984 as a Police Officer for the Winston-Salem Police Department. In 1987, he became an Arson Investigator with the Winston-Salem Fire Department, while serving in the role of Assistant Fire Marshal. He then moved to work with high-risk offenders at the North Carolina Department of Probation and Parole. From 1995 to 2016, Bobby served the United States Department of Justice as a Special Agent in the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA). He then specialized in investigating crimes against the government, including organized crime, money laundering, gang violence, and drug trafficking.

Bobby has various certifications, including a Department of Justice Instructor. His fluency in Spanish afforded him the opportunity to work extensively throughout the United States of America and other Spanish speaking countries.

# Sheriff Bobby F. Kimbrough, Jr.

Bobby has nearly 40 years of law enforcement experience. He brings his professional experiences and personal passions to projects throughout the community. As an active community leader, Bobby founded Branded for Knowledge. This is a program that focuses on strengthening, empowering, and encouraging individuals to reach their full potential. He has also established the Star of Hope Scholarship Fund with the Winston-Salem Foundation, to assist students who have been victims of serious crimes. Bobby is also the co-founder of the Executive Leadership Program for First Responders at the School of Professional Studies at Wake Forest University. Bobby also completed various leadership courses such as: Becoming a Leader, Developing Your Style and Making Sound Decisions, and Emotional Intelligence in Leadership courses from Harvard University in 2020. Alongside, he also completed the Dale Carnegie Skills for Leadership Course. Present day, Bobby continues to cultivate his leadership skills.

As the first African American Sheriff of Forsyth County, Sheriff Kimbrough has worked to improve the relationship between the Forsyth County Sheriff's Office and the community, building bridges, and enhancing the work already being done by the team members at the Forsyth County Sheriff's Office. Despite his numerous accolades, including receiving the Order of the Long Leaf Pine Award, the President's Lifetime Achievement Award in recognition of his service to the community, the Community Impact Award from High Point University, and the author of three (3) books, Bobby has many more accomplishments but considers the greatest of his accolades to be a parent to his seven (7) sons, raising them to be respectful men, and his service in the Office of the People, the Forsyth County Sheriff's Office. During his spare time, Sheriff Kimbrough enjoys flying, reading, spending time with his family, and inspiring the community to be the best they can be.

## Forsyth County Demographics

- The 2024 Census estimated a population of 398,143 citizens making Forsyth County the 4<sup>th</sup> most populous in North Carolina.

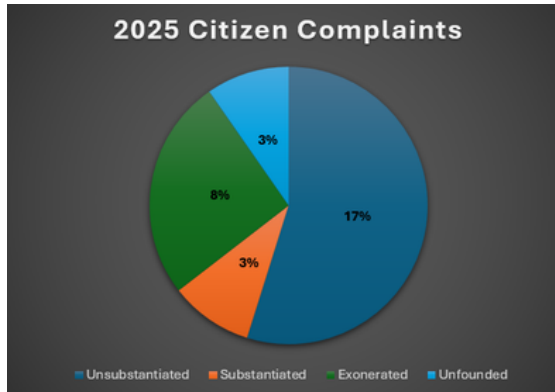
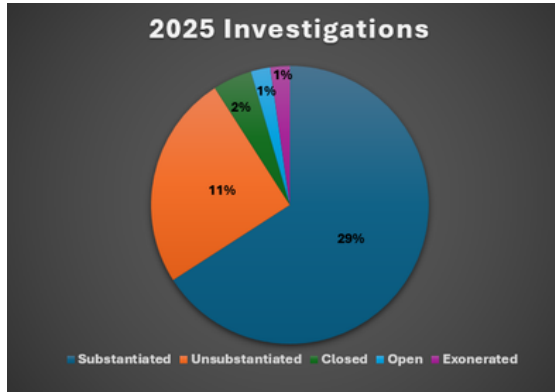

## Professional Standards

The Professional Standards Division, consists of the Internal Affairs Section and the Training Section. These sections function to ensure the continued delivery of professional law enforcement services, to the community. The sections also maintain the integrity of the Forsyth County Sheriff's Office.

The Internal Affairs (IA) Section conducts administrative investigations, involving staff members assigned to all bureaus within the agency and reports findings directly to the Sheriff, Chief Deputy, and Bureau Commanders. Internal Affairs ensures fairness during each review with an emphasis on consistency, while taking allegations of personnel misconduct seriously. The Internal Affairs Section received and investigated 31 complaints and/or concerns in 2025 which involved 60 staff members.

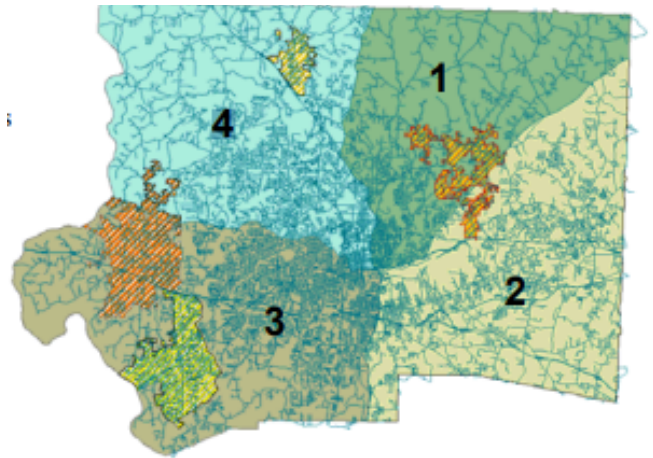

# Field Services Patrol

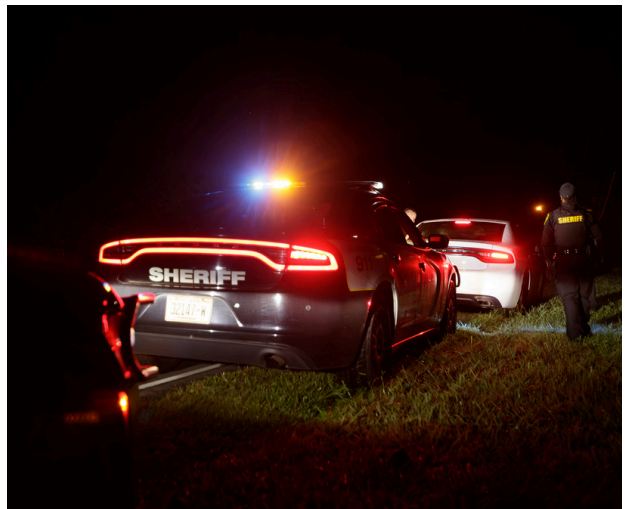

# Community Services Animal Service Operations

The Animal Services Division is responsible for investigating animal complaints, and filing charges either civil or criminal for violation(s) of state laws and local ordinances related to animals. Animal regulations are governed by North Carolina State law, and locally by Forsyth County Code Chapter 6 – Animals. The Animal Services Division works in partnership with the Forsyth Humane Society, who cares for all dogs and cats that are brought to the animal shelter by officers. All other animals are cared for by staff members assigned to the Animal Services Division. The Animal Services Division also works closely with the Forsyth County Animal Advisory Board to ensure local ordinances reflect current views, so that regulations are enforceable when determined.

# Investigative Services Criminal Investigations

The dedicated men and women assigned to the Investigative Services Division (ISD), are responsible for conducting criminal investigations. A few categories are major crimes against persons and property, apprehending suspects, and preparing cases for prosecution. ISD major crimes investigations include, but are not limited to homicide, armed robbery, rape, theft, property crime, arson, and financial crimes.

FCSO has established its own digital forensics lab.

The Digital Forensics Investigative Services Lab is part of the Investigative Services Division (ISD). Examiners who work in the FCSO DFIS Lab, are required to attend comprehensive training. It is the practice of collecting and examining information from digital evidence such as cell phones, cameras, the internet, and other sources.

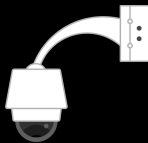

# Investigative Services Criminal Investigations



The Forsyth County Sheriff's Office in partnership with Bridges to Hope launched the Save Our Society (SOS) Pilot Program. This program aims to enhance the safety and protection of victims facing threats due to domestic violence, stalking, and related offenses. Those accepted into the SOS program, will receive the following resources and services:

- A security central GPS device.
- Front and back door cameras connected to FUSUS.
- A home safety inspection conducted by an FCSO investigator.
- Daily check-ins by a victim advocate.
- Premise alerts entered into CAD with scheduled safety checks.

The program combines technology and proactive support to protect individuals and families from domestic violence by ensuring timely intervention when danger arises.

# Investigative Services

## Sex Offender Registry

As a statutorily mandated function of the Sheriff's Office, the Sex Offender Registry Unit (SORU) is responsible for ensuring compliance with Article 27A of the North Carolina General Statutes. Specifically, this is the registration of persons convicted of a sex offense or certain offenses against minors and the enforcement of applicable statutes. This unit also serves as a liaison between the public and law enforcement, concerning relevant laws or inquiries about registered offenders. Although not mandated by statute, the SORU conducts random checks on registered offenders in Forsyth County, to ensure compliance with the requirements of the registry. The Forsyth County Sheriff's Office has implemented one of the most proactive programs in North Carolina in an effort to ensure registry compliance.

# Special Investigative Services

## Real Time Intelligence Center & Crime Analysis

### Real Time Intelligence Center (RTIC)



RTIC is a centralized technology center that assists in gathering, analyzing, and investigating intelligence in order to more effectively deploy resources. We are the first Sheriff's Office in the state of North Carolina to have its own RTIC. Multiple unique software programs work together to provide deputies with comprehensive intelligence. RTIC not only aids in identifying crime patterns but also ultimately prevents crime, ensuring a safer community for all. RTIC staff members relay information to deputies in real-time while they are responding to a call. Investigators can request information from a wide network of community stakeholders.



### Crime Analysis

Our Crime Analysts perform tactical, strategic and operational analysis for the Forsyth County Sheriff's Office. They assess emerging crime trends by analyzing data, and also assist with identifying suspects. Our two Crime Analysts utilize crime statistics to identify patterns and develop strategies to assist law enforcement with combating criminal activities.

# Special Investigative Services

## Drone Team

The Sheriff's Office Drone Team was created in 2018 and is supervised by Cpl. Shaver. The Team consists of 3 full-time Deputies and 7 volunteer Deputies. Recently, the Team added 3 civilian staff who work as analysts within the RTIC and help operate the Drone as First Responder (DFR) program . All team members are Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) Part 107 certified pilots for small unmanned aircraft systems (sUAS). Sworn Team members are assigned drones and are ready to respond to incidents at a moment's notice. Together, the Drone Team works to safely deploy sUAS in support of FCSCO and partner public safety agency operations such as search & rescue, disaster response, tactical overwatch, and information gathering. The Drone Team currently partners with Duke University to deliver AEDs by drone to people suffering from cardiac arrest. The operation went live on September 8, 2025 and the Team has conducted over 200 training/test flights so far.

# Special Investigative Services Specialized Teams

The Special Investigative Services Division is comprised of multiple specialized teams. These teams include the Dignitary Protection Detail, the Forsyth County Drug Task Force (DTF), Special Weapons and Tactics (SWAT), the Tactical High Risk Apprehension Team (THRAT), and the Task Force Officer Unit. The investigations and operations performed by the SISD range from infiltrating drug and human trafficking organizations, intercepting contraband during travel, serving high risk arrest and search warrants, protecting dignitaries inside Forsyth County, and working larger multi state cases with our federal partners. These partners include the FBI, ATF, USMS, DEA, and HSI. These operations require dedicated teamwork from several teams simultaneously. The SISD team structure allows for a collective attack on crime outside the realm of normal criminal investigations.

# Special Investigative Services Juvenile Intervention and Investigation Team (JIIT)

The Juvenile Intervention and Investigation Team (J.I.I.T) was established on May 28, 2022. The team is comprised of 8 deputies, which includes supervisors, a designated K-9 and a senior office assistant. The team's two main functions are 1) to deter juvenile involvement in violent crimes through mentorship and provide a positive role model for the juveniles, and 2) to remove criminal elements and negative influences from the community through enforcement action. They utilize community programs and referrals from parents, SRO's and Juvenile Justice.

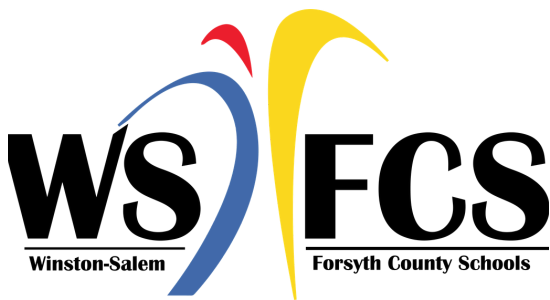

Currently the School Resource Officer program serves *twelve* middle schools and *thirteen* high schools.

# Judicial Services

## Civil Section

Pursuant to the Constitution and General Statutes of North Carolina, the Office of the Sheriff is empowered to maintain security of the Courts and to serve and enforce Civil Orders issued by all the Courts within Forsyth County. The Civil Section consists of five units; Process Service, Evictions, Executions, Domestic Violence, and Process Intake Unit. The Process Service Unit serves court processes to include Summons, Subpoenas, Notice of Hearings, Orders to Show Cause, Orders for Arrest and Child Custody Orders. The Evictions Unit primarily serves Magistrate Summons for Summary Ejectment, and Writs of Possession of Real Property. The Executions Unit serves Orders of the Court that involves the seizure of assets to satisfy a monetary judgement. The Domestic Violence Unit primarily serves 50B orders. The Process Intake Unit is responsible for accurately receiving, processing and assigning all civil and criminal processes to the appropriate officers for service.

# Judicial Services

## Court Security



The primary responsibility of the Court Security Sector is to oversee the safety and security of everyone that crosses the threshold of the Forsyth County Hall of Justice and the Kernersville Court facility. Deputies are responsible for maintaining order during court, and providing security for the judicial staff and clerks while court is in session. In the event an evacuation situation should occur, the Court Security Section is responsible for evacuating all personnel from the building, including the inmates. Along with the safety and security of everyone in the building, the Court Security Sector is responsible for transporting inmates to the courts from the Law Enforcement Detention Center.

# Administrative Services Records/Pistol Permits

The Records Unit is responsible for collecting, processing and maintaining all Incident Reports, Supplemental Reports, Traffic Accident Reports, Arrest Reports, Citations, Traffic Stop Reports, and Warning Tickets. The Records Unit assists the public by locating reports, researching past incidents and directing them to other agencies as needed. The Forsyth County Sheriff's Office issues Pistol Purchase Permits and Concealed Handgun Permits, pursuant to applicable North Carolina General Statutes. Fingerprinting is conducted as a courtesy by the Sheriff's Office for a minimal fee.

# Forsyth County Sheriff's Office Index Crime

Index Crime includes the total number of violent crimes (murder, rape, robbery and aggravated assault) and property crimes (burglary, larceny, and motor vehicle theft). The Forsyth County Sheriff's Office reports crime data based on categories and definitions conforming to National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS) standards in which crimes per incidents are reported. The agency converted their reporting systems in July of 2020 to follow this recommended system by the FBI. The following charts and tables report all crime using the NIBRS method. The total number of victims is counted in murder, rape, and aggravated assault. The total number of incident charges is counted in robbery, burglary, and larceny.

# Forsyth County Law Enforcement Detention Center

- The Forsyth County Sheriff's Office Law Enforcement Detention Center is an adult maximum security (400,000 square feet) detention facility that houses male and female sentenced misdemeanant and pretrial inmates. The facility is an eleven-story high rise structure containing 735 modular steel cells (276 double bunked and 464 single cells) to accommodate a total of 1,016 inmates.
- Regardless of the reason for someone being held in the Sheriff's custody, certain services must be provided. In many ways the jail is its own city. The following is a list of some of the services provided to inmates at the Detention Center:
  - Food Services
  - Healthcare Services
  - Laundry Services
  - Mail Services
  - Commissary Services
  - Educational Services
  - Religious Services
  - Transportation Services
- All necessary steps to incarcerate a subject may be accomplished at the Detention Center, including alcohol breath testing, arrest warrant issuance, and complete subject identification.



# Detention Bureau

## Security Services

The Security Services Division is responsible for continuous operation of the facility and the security of inmates. Areas of responsibilities include Detention Security Teams, Special Response Team (SRT), Classification, Special Housing Unit, Locks and Keys, Community Court Services, Gang Intelligence Program and inmate discipline hearings. To maintain control and order, inmates are housed based on their current charges, past experiences within the facility and evaluation during the intake and classification process.

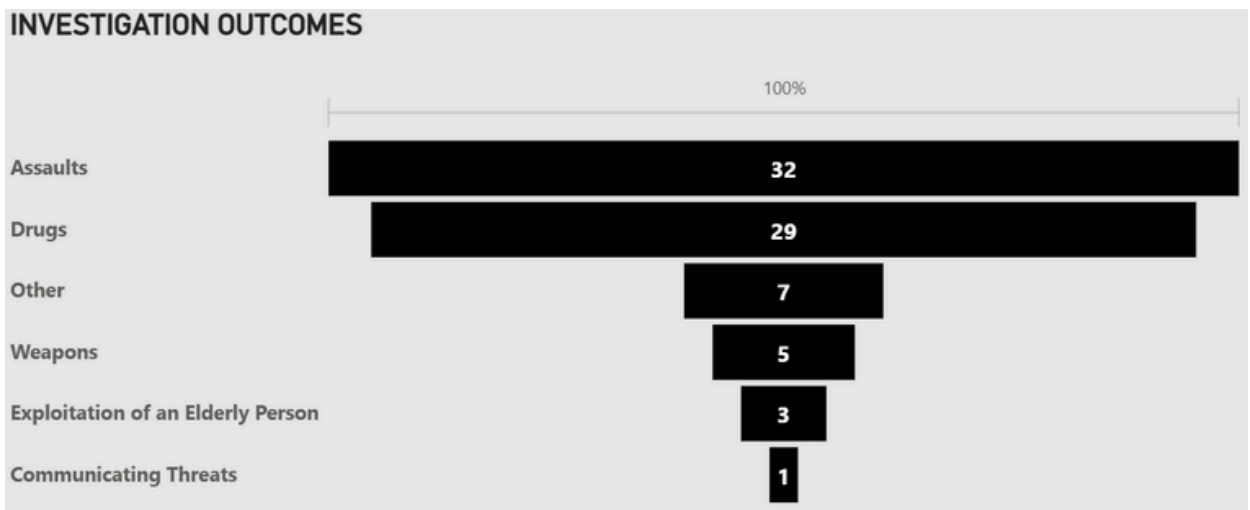
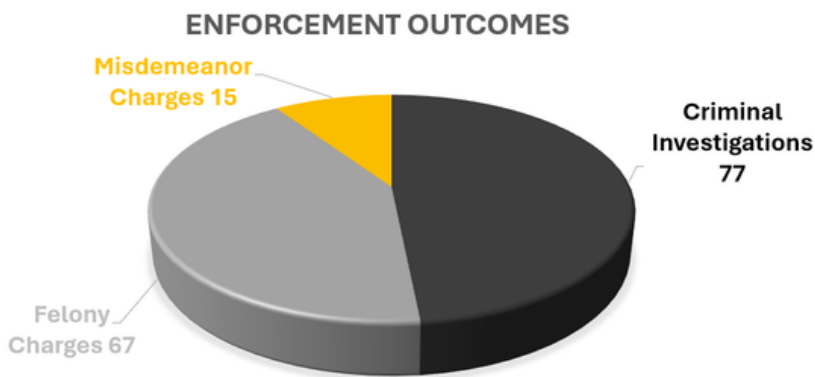

## Real Time Intelligence Center

The RTIC-D enhances the safety and security of the Forsyth County Law Enforcement Detention Center. As the first program of its kind in North Carolina, the Forsyth County Sheriff's office Utilizes real-time intelligence to support the investigation and prosecution of criminal activity. Under the leadership and vision of Sheriff Kimbrough, this capability enables close collaboration with neighboring agencies and prosecutorial partners while strengthening intelligence analysis within the detention population.

Responsibilities include records management, inmate intake, inmate final release, custody release, inmate property management, pre-trial release, warehouse management, laundry, contract services and public lobby.
